RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The payment of \$10.00 to the Treasurer of Officers and Directors constitutes a person a member for the current year. Member must be 13 years of age and older.
2. No articles shall be removed from the arena until 4:30 p.m. on the second day of the show. The Society will not be held responsible for specials. Articles removed before 4:30 p.m. could forfeit prize money.
3. While the Directors will take every precaution possible under the circumstances to ensure the safety of articles sent for exhibition, should any articles be lost or stolen, they will give every assistance in their power for the restoration thereof, but will not make any payment for the injury or loss.
4. Should any fraud or deception be discovered on the part of any exhibitor or his agent, the Board of Directors may withhold any prize awarded and may prohibit such an exhibitor from exhibiting for such time as they determine, and may publish the name of such exhibitor, should they deem it proper to do so. And further, the party charged with fraud or deception will be obliged to furnish proof, to the satisfaction of the Officers of the Society, that the exhibits protested conform to the rules of the Society.
5. All articles entered for the exhibition must be in their proper place no later than 12 o'clock noon on first day of fair. This rule will be strictly enforced. Exhibitors unable to place exhibits Friday may do so Thursday, 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Antiques to be placed on Saturday between 8 a.m. to 9 a.m.
6. No article can be exhibited in more than one class or section of a class.
7. Horses and mules must be bona fide property of the driver. Proof of insurance must be provided. If horses and mules are going to be in the parade, they are to be at the Township Shed no later than 11:30 a.m.
8. Animals entered for exhibition must be on grounds by 11 a.m., Saturday. Each animal must be provided with a secure means of fastening and shown in the class and section to which it properly belongs, and once in a class except as a herd.
9. No more than one premium in any section will be awarded any exhibitor, or paid if awarded, with the exception of livestock, where not more than two premiums in any section will be awarded.
10. Should there be only one exhibitor in any class or section of a class, the judges are to use their own discretion as to awarding any premiums, and they may refrain from making any award where they deem the animals or articles unworthy. **NO PERSON WILL BE ALLOWED TO INTERFERE WITH THE JUDGES WHILE IN CHARGE OF THEIR DUTIES.**

11. Produce must be the growth of the present year, and grown by the exhibitor. Clover seeds, bean, peas and soybeans, the growth of the immediate preceding year only, will be accepted.

12. Exhibitors are particularly requested to have articles for competition in Classes properly entered, so as to correspond with the Prize List. Unless otherwise asked for, only one article in each entry. In Ladies' Work, the judge must give preference to new work.

13. The Treasurer will commence paying premiums by cheque on and after October 15, 2025. All cheques must clear the bank by April 15, 2026. In order to prepare the list of memberships for ensuing year, the Treasurer is to retain the membership fee from prize money of each exhibitor.

14. Directors retain the right to pay only a percentage of the prizes should finances not be sufficient.

15. In case of accidents on the grounds, the Society will not be held responsible.

16. Non-members will be charged \$10.00 admission, High School students with cards \$5.00, Public School children free. Membership ticket admits one.

17. A list of winning entries on the form provided in the prize list must be returned to the Treasurer within two weeks after Fall Fair or prize money at discretion of directors may not be paid.

18. In the case of an error or omission in the printing of the prize list, the committee in charge have the power to rectify same.

SPECIAL NOTICE

The Directors will meet Tuesday, October 7th at 8:00 p.m. at Desboro Arena to receive any complaints or protest, correct any errors that may have been made, and to attend to any other business in connection with the Exhibition. Complaints, if any, are to be submitted in writing, to the secretary prior to September 30th. The Treasurer will proceed to pay the prize money on October 15, and no exhibitor will be paid prior to this date.

5. No pulling vehicles are to be left running while unattended by the Operator.
6. The universal numbering system for each class is as follows: the first digits in the number are the upper limit of the weight class and the last digits signify the order of pull. For example 9501 = 9500 is the weight class, and the number 1 signifies the first puller.
7. No one is allowed on the rack except the contestant and persons needed to operate the pull.
8. All pulls must be started from a tight chain and then the raising of two green flags by the flag persons.
9. Loss of ballast weight or equipment while hooked to the sled is cause for disqualification.
10. No alcoholic beverages are permitted on the grounds. No one shall operate machinery under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
11. Drivers must be at least 16 (sixteen) years of age.
12. No riders on tractors.
13. The judge's decisions are final. A judge will stop and disqualify any tractor that, in the sole opinion of the judge is not being operated in a safe manner, or in accordance with site safety rules or tractor pull rules.

TRACTOR PULL RULES STOCK CLASSES:

1. Tractors are to be 1980 and older.
2. Entry fee is \$10.00 per hook for stock class.
3. **RIMS & WHEELS** – Tires must be on rim width, not exceeding tire manufactures recommended width. No cut or groomed tires allowed. Pressed steel wheels are allowed front and rear.
4. **WEIGHTS** – Suitcase weights and custom make weight brackets are permitted, front weight and weights to extend no further and 11 feet from centre or rear axle. No weights behind centre of rear axle. All weights must be sure on brackets, and NOT on the cab or on the platform (no chains). No weights are to be positioned where they impede the safe operation of the tractor. Each weight class is allowed a 100 pds. Grace. All tractors are to weigh after completing their pull and will have a draw bar height checked.
5. **HITCHES** – Starting at 4500 labs. Hitches must be a minimum of 18" back from the centre of the rear axle and a maximum of 18' drawbar height. Hitch material cannot be thinner than ¾" and not thicker than 1.25". Hitch has to have a 3" hole with 1" material thickness around the hole, or a twist clevis bolted or pinned tightly to the drawbar with a minimum of 3.5" hole. Hitches and drawbars must be stationary in all directions. The sled hook must be in a vertical position to be able to pull. 9500 lbs. and over classes will be allowed a drawbar height of 20". No pulling from 3 point hitch, 2 point hitch, or any hydraulic lift.
6. **APPEARANCE** – Tractors must maintain original stock appearance. If a part is not found in the manufacturer's parts book, it cannot be used. No extra accessories allowed with the exception of weight brackets, hang-on weights, wheelie bars, wheels, rims, bolt on hubs, draw bar, muffler and air cleaner. No aluminum allowed except for weight brackets and wheelie bars. No chrome allowed except for exhaust pipes. No homemade rear end covers allowed.

All guards, shrouds, covers, and shields shall be in place as from the factory and be made of original material (steel or iron) and as near life factory as possible. Seat must be an original seat, or a manufactured seat made for a farm tractor placed with stock mountings (such as TSC). Fenders are mandatory.
